This newsletter is dedicated to my father who guided my thoughts by his example and inspired me to do the very best I could to honor his Legacy.

As I stare at a blank sheet of paper, with no knowledge of how to format a newsletter or even where to begin, I have nothing but respect and admiration for my father, our former Chapter President, for his ability to publish such a document so effortlessly. Or was it? I'm beginning to believe my father possessed the unique talent that made the difficult seem easy and the impossible, possible. And so it begins, as a father passes the torch onto his son, as one-generation hands off to another, ...it's all about "Keeping the Legacy Alive."

My father once said, "...keeping in touch with the constituents should be the prime requisite of any organization." So we will, with this short copy, let you know what is going on with **your** chapter.

In 1992, when Gen. Colin Powell spoke at the dedication of the Buffalo Soldier Monument at Fort Leavenworth, KS, he described the statue using these words. "Look at him. Soldier of the nation. Eagles on his buttons, crossed sabers on his canteen, a rifle in his hand, a pistol on his hip. Courageous, iron will... The Buffalo Soldier believed that hatred and bigotry and prejudice could not defeat him, that through his pain and sacrifice they would be destroyed for the evil things they are."

Why did Black men join the Army after the Civil War? In their own way each of them was "Keeping the Legacy Alive." Did the end justify the means? Simply stated, YES! Their Legacy was slavery and their goal was FREEDOM.

We've had a year to adjust, transition and grow. Now it's time to roll up our sleeves and join our fellow members who've been, "Keeping the Legacy Alive," by carrying on the task of educating the public about the contributions of Blacks in the military, with a strong focus on the Buffalo Soldier. Robert Frost wrote, "...two roads diverged in a wood, and I took the one less traveled by. And that has made all the difference." I challenge you to join your fellow troopers and me on that road less traveled, ...and together we will make a difference.

On February 27, 2004, the doors officially opened to **The Fred D. Jones Youth Center** in Hesperia, California. The event was well attended by members of the Greater Los Angeles Area Chapter of the Ninth and Tenth (Horse) Cavalry Association. They're better known as "The Buffalo Soldiers," an organization of which Fred Jones was the Chapter President before his passing. Bob Burton, CEO of VisionQuest, Dave Simpson, President of the LodgeMakers of California and elected Officials all spoke of Trooper Jones' influence, inspiration and determination of seeing this facility come to fruition. The current Chapter President, Trooper Eugene Lewis spoke of his 59-year friendship with Trooper Jones. They both enlisted in the Army in 1943 and served together in the 28th Cavalry Regiment, Troop 'C' at Camp Lockett, CA on the California-Mexico border about 80 miles east of San Diego. Fred's great-grandchildren sung the National Anthem and an original composition titled "Buffalo Soldier" written by his great-grandson, Rodney Taylor Jr. The highlight of the dedication occurred when young VisionQuest soldiers, who started out from the VisionQuest camp in Tucson, AZ, timed their arrival to coincide with this event. They came marching onto the facilities' grounds on foot and horseback. It was a very impressive and moving sight to behold.



Keeping the Legacy Alive

On July 28th 1866 while the Thirty-Ninth Congress was in session an Act was presented to the assembled body. The document can be found in Sess. I Chapter 299 and is titled "An Act to increase and fix the Military Peace Establishment of the United States." It goes on to say, "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the military peace establishment of the United States shall hereafter consist of five regiments of artillery, ten regiments of cavalry, forty-five regiments of infantry, the professors and corps of cadets of the United States Military Academy, and such other forces as shall be provided for by this act, to be known as the Army of the United States."

And so it began, what I refer to as an experiment included in an Act to establish what we now know as the United States Army, has succeeded beyond all expectations. As Gen. Powell said, "...the Buffalo Soldier believed that hatred and bigotry and prejudice could not defeat him, that through his pain and sacrifice they would be destroyed for the evil things they are." All the Buffalo Soldier wanted was a chance, however slight, to prove he was just as good and in many cases better than the average soldier. And once that door of opportunity was opened it is our Legacy to see to it that it never shuts again.
